

Stay out of harm - replace your smoke alarm

A smoke alarm can save lives. More than half of fatal home fires between 2000 and 2014 were in properties without a smoke alarm.

But simply having a smoke alarm is not enough. It must be working properly.

It's been 10 years since NSW mandatory smoke alarm legislation was passed. Since smoke alarm manufacturers strongly advise replacing them every 10 years, this year, Fire & Rescue NSW is urging residents to replace outdated smoke alarms with the latest photoelectric alarms.

Fire & Rescue NSW Commissioner, Greg Mullins is recommending that every house in NSW be fitted with the latest photoelectric smoke alarm. Photoelectric alarms provide faster warnings – and will keep you and your family safe for the next 10 years.

Photoelectric alarms are available at your local hardware store.

Photoelectric alarms are more effective at detecting the types of fires that are most likely to cause a home fire death: smouldering fires. They are also less likely than other alarms to go off when you are cooking or using the shower. They will say 'photoelectric' on the packet.

Fire & Rescue NSW is asking all NSW residents to REPLACE their smoke alarms. You could be saving you or your loved one's life.

If you need help checking or replacing the battery in your smoke alarm, contact your local fire station and ask about the Smoke Alarm and Battery Replacement (SABRE) program for seniors and people with disabilities.



Plan and Prepare - your bushfire strategy

Given the recent large bushfire at Missabotti it is a timely reminder for your house and property in Bowraville to be fire prepared. With so little rain in autumn and the more recent strong winds everything is extremely dry.

If your house is surrounded by bush you might like to consider having a bush fire survival plan—you can download one from the Rural Fire Service website. GO to the PLAN AND PREPARE tab.

Even if your property is not surrounded by bush you will find the plan helpful.

- Do you know what you do if there is a fire in your area?
- Do you have pets that need to be considered?
- What is your plan if there is a fire and you are not at home but your pets are?
- If your property is at risk during a fire have you planned where you will go if you leave?
- How will you get there?
- What will you take glasses, medications, phone and charger, money etc?

If you have children or anyone who has compromised health residing with you a strategy for "in the event" is a really good idea.

When a fire comes, it is too late to make a plan!

There is also a list of 'things you can do' on the website to help you be prepared.

HP Notebook Computer Battery Safety Recall and Replacement Program

Product safety is a big deal, it is important that we are aware if one of the products we use or own is potentially faulty. For laptop users, fire hazards due to battery faults is a big concern. The following is from the HP website:-

"On June 14, 2016 HP announced a worldwide voluntary safety recall and replacement program cooperation with various government regulatory agencies, for certain notebook computer batteries. The affected batteries were shipped with specific HP, Compaq, ProBook, HP ENVY, Compaq Presario, and HP Pavilion Notebook Computers sold worldwide from March 2013 through August 2015, and/or were sold as accessories or spares, or provided replacements through Support. These batteries have the potential to overheat, posing a fire and burn hazard to customers."

Wireless charging over distance the next big thing

US company Energous is developing wireless charging technology that can charge gadgets anywhere within a 30-foot radius of a charging dock or "power router".

As the amount of devices we carry around every day increases self-charging devices will change the way we live our lives.

Current mainstream wireless charging technology requires you to place your phone or

other device on a charging pad but Energous' solution means you could have your phone in your pocket in the next room and it would still charge. This technology, called WattUp, can charge up to 12 devices requiring 10 watts or less simultaneously.

The router sends a charging signal via radiofrequency, just like Wi-Fi to microchips embedded in compatible devices, and the microchips then convert the signal into DC power.

Energous claims that at a distance of five feet, four connected devices will charge as quickly as if they were plugged into a wall.

Tech giant Apple is also reportedly developing long-range wireless charging technology for its iPhones.

Nikola Labs argues the world is in the midst of a "war of waves" which will see rivalling developments in wireless charging technology "define what it means to live and work in the 21st century".

250,000 words - app terms & conditions!

The average consumer could easily find themselves having to read more than 250,000 words of app terms and conditions. For most people this is an impossible task and consumers are effectively giving mobile apps free rein to do almost whatever they want.

The Norwegian Consumer Council has downloaded the terms of service and privacy policies for apps that you would find on an "average" mobile. Together they exceed the New Testament in length and would take more than 24 hours to read out loud.



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

Orchids

Black Orchids by Gillian Slovo

The first part of this story is set in Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) in 1946. A young, English Evelyn meets a Sinhalese man, Emil, while on an outing with her sister Marjorie. The two girls live with their mother but are not in the wealthy white set of Ceylon society.

Emil comes from a wealthy Sinhalese family – he's privileged, charming and

quite daring. He often behaves in a way not quite appropriate to the family's standing in society nor to expectations of the time. Evelyn starts dating Emil secretly but they eventually get engaged, much against their parents' wishes and advice.

Despite loving Ceylon, Evelyn dreams of a life in England. Emil, Evelyn and their young son, Milton, eventually make the long journey, arriving in England in the early 1950s. It's a place and time that has yet to accept a mixed racial couple or outsiders so life for Evelyn is not as she dreamed. Even though Emil is very successful and becomes very wealthy, nothing really improves especially as Emil refuses to let the racist attitudes of others affect him.

Unfortunately, Milton who is quite a bit darker than his honey-skinned father, is not so unaffected. His life experiences are not as happy as those of his much fairer sister.

Evelyn makes a mistake which costs her her marriage and contact with her children who grow up thinking she is dead.

I won't tell you any more!

Having been to Sri Lanka I was reminded of the sultry warmth, lush growth, packed roads with no apparent road rules and life in general that Gillian Slovo so accurately describes despite being 60+ years on. However, for me the novel was a little 'weak' although I can't exactly pinpoint why.

Don't let this stop you from picking it up.

Grace Vandenburg is a teacher on leave from teaching due to her mental health issue. Grace counts. Everything. All the time. Often, what she counts affects the very next thing she is going to do, eg the number of poppy seeds on her slice of cake is the number of bites she must take to eat it.

For Grace, numbers make total sense to her; it's numbers that have meaning; they hold the world together. Unfortunately counting everything inhibits her life – she has no social life, cannot work, her family can only call at a specific time on specific days, all the things she does take more time than they should......

Grace meets Seamus O'Reilly who is lovely and likes her for who she is but he thinks she would be better off without the counting. He tries to help by encouraging Grace to re-enter counselling. As you can guess it has disastrous results.

This story was interesting but terribly annoying – the counting got to me!!! However, it's a very good insight how a person's mental health might deteriorate and how it affects them and everyone around them.


Understanding Chronic Pain

Most of us think of pain as a result of an injury or disease. We expect it will go away once we have medical treatment or the injury heals. For many people this is the case. However, for others, the pain doesn't go away. In some cases you can have pain even without an injury or obvious body damage. This ongoing type of pain is called chronic pain. It is estimated that one in three Australians live with chronic pain.

Acute or chronic pain - what's the difference?

Acute pain is usually short-term. It tends to be more associated with damage to the body and will usually go away after healing. Acute pain is a very important alarm system – it alerts us that some action is needed.

Chronic pain lasts longer, beyond the time you would expect an injury to heal. Chronic pain often does not indicate ongoing damage in our body – it's like the alarm has been left on and someone's turned the volume up.



The pain is less to do with an injury to body tissue and more to do with what's happening in our nervous system. Our nervous system can become sensitised and overactive so that we continue to feel pain, even without any ongoing tissue damage.

Everyone's experience of pain is different. Two people with the same injury, such as a sprained ankle, can have a very different pain experience.

This is because pain is complex – how we perceive pain involves an interaction between our mind and our body.

This interaction involves the nervous system and other factors such as genetics, culture, thoughts, previous pain experiences, stress and what was happening in our lives when the pain started.

Because chronic pain is complex there is no 'one size fits all' way of treating it. To be successful pain managers we may have to use a combination of things such as medications, exercise, diet, relaxation, thinking strategies and more. Over time you can turn down the volume of your pain.

Chronic pain support

Living with chronic pain can be a very lonely thing. You may be feeling quite isolated and 'over it' and think that no one really understands your experience. You might even feel that people don't believe you. Many people tell us about these experiences.

Don't despair, you aren't crazy! And you aren't on your own either. Over the years many volunteers have strengthened us so that we can work towards greater community understanding about chronic pain.

Our mission is to reduce the unnecessary suffering and isolation caused by chronic pain in the Australian community.

Our vision is that no Australian living with persistent pain should suffer alone or without access to resources and information which help them effectively manage their pain in a manner promoting dignity and self-respect, regardless of age, gender, culture, belief, socio-economic or compensation status.

TRY OUR FORUM: Our online forum provides a safe place for those in the community who suffer chronic pain to talk with others who share their experience. Our moderators monitor the Forum, all of whom experience daily chronic pain. Because of this there is complete understanding of all who come into this supportive space. These moderators give constant feedback to the Board of Chronic Pain Australia so that the organisation remains grounded and in touch with those who suffer in the community but do not have a voice.

On our forum you will find:

- A place of support for those who suffer the isolation and stigma of chronic pain.
- A place where you will meet people like yourself and can get the moral support you need to validate your experience as you travel along your pain journey.
- A safe place where your voice can be heard & listened to.

"The current state of terms and conditions for digital services is bordering on the absurd. Their scope, length and complexity mean it is virtually impossible to make good and informed decisions. Standards should most definitely be established for how terms, conditions and privacy statements are written and presented," says Digital Policy Director Finn Myrstad at the Norwegian Consumer Council.

Windows 10 - Automatic Updates

When Microsoft releases a Windows 10 update files will automatically download by default which is a big change from past operating systems that provided greater control over download times.

This is useful on the one hand, as it ensures your desktop, mobile and other devices are safe from major vulnerabilities, but it fails to take individual user factors into account, such as bandwith limits and data caps.

So be aware of your download limit as it can disappear very quickly.

Windows 10 - Privacy Practices

Criticism has been levelled at Microsoft's privacy practices since the launch of Windows 10.

Mostly at the default settings which supposedly let Microsoft gather a broad range of personal data without clearly informing the user.

By dafault Windows 10 can gather a surprising amount including: information on your day-to-day desktop use, web activity which can help narrow down your interests and tastes(eg: movies and food), your location, personal data via app and software accounts and even the content of SMS messages.

When they move beyond the basics kids can let their imaginations run wild and a long the way, Minecraft's young players learn things like computer coding, engineering, architecture, urban planning and math.






