Kennards Hire Rally Australia FIA World Rally Championship Coffs Coast 17-20 November, 2016

SOME of the fastest drivers on the planet return to the Coffs Coast for Kennards Hire Rally Australia on 17-20 November 2016.

The 25th Rally Australia will be the 14th and final round of the FIA World Rally Championship (WRC) bringing a big contingent of drivers, teams, media, supporters and spectators from around world.

The three-day rally demands extreme skill, endurance and bravery of crews and gives spectators a thrilling up-close experience. The WRC is regarded as the most challenging series in international motorsport.

Millions of daily television viewers, in more than 140 countries will track stars such as triple World Champion Sebastien Ogier of France, New Zealand's Hayden Paddon, Mads Ostberg of Norway, Jari Matti Latvala of Finland and Stefan Lefebvre of France as they tackle more than 300 kms of competition stages to the north, south and west of the Coffs Harbour service headquarters.

Top Australian drivers also take part with contenders including one of the world's leading female rally pilots, 28-year-old Molly Taylor of Sydney, and Australian Champion Scott Pedder who is contesting the WRC2 category in Europe and at home.

Spectators can see the stars and cars up-close for free in Bowraville as they come down High Street from the refuel point in Cook Street so come along and bring your camera with you.

Smart Cities . . . just a part of the Internet of Things

A **smart city** is an urban development vision to integrate multiple information and communication technology (ICT) and Internet of Things (IoT) solutions in a secure fashion to manage a city's assets – the city's assets include, but are not limited to, local departments' information systems, schools, libraries, transportation systems, hospitals, power plants, water supply networks, waste management, law enforcement, and other community services.

The goal of building a smart city is to improve quality of life by using urban informatics and technology to improve the efficiency of services and meet residents' needs. ICT allows city officials to interact directly with the community and the city infrastructure and to monitor what is happening in the city, how the city is evolving and how to enable a better quality of life. Through the use of sensors integrated with real-time monitoring systems data are collected from citizens and devices - then processed and analyzed. The information and knowledge gathered are keys to tackling inefficiency.

ICT is used to enhance quality, performance and interactivity of urban services, to reduce costs and resource consumption and to improve contact between citizens and government.—Smart city applications are developed with the goal of improving the management of urban flows and allowing for real time responses to challenges. A smart city may therefore be more prepared to respond to challenges than one with a simple 'transactional' relationship with its citizens. Yet the term itself remains unclear to its specifics and therefore open to many interpretations and subject.

Other terms that have been used for similar concepts include *cyberville*, *digital city*, *electronic communities*, *flexicity*, *information city*, *intelligent*

city, knowledge-based city, MESH city, telecity, teletopia, Ubiquitous city, wired city.

Sectors that have been developing smart city technology include government services, transport and traffic management, energy, health care, water, innovative urban agriculture and waste management.

Major technological, economic and environmental changes have generated interest in smart cities including climate change, economic restructuring, the move to online retail and entertainment, ageing populations, urban population growth and pressures on public finances. The European Union (EU) has devoted constant efforts to devising a strategy for achieving 'smart' urban growth for its metropolitan city-regions.

The EU has developed a range of programmes under 'Europe's Digital Agenda". In 2010 it highlighted its focus on strengthening innovation and investment in ICT services for the purpose of improving public services and quality of life. Arup estimates that the global market for smart urban services will be \$400 billion per annum by 2020. Examples of Smart City technologies and programs have been implemented in the UK, Holland, Spain and Sweden. An important cluster of Smart City technological companies exists in Israel with Tel Aviv being awarded the World Smart City Award in 2014.

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

Life Sentence by Judith Carter

Francis Harman is a Chief Superintendent, in her 50s verging on retiring. She has elderly parents who take up a great deal of her time and even more of her energy. In fact they are not particularly nice to her, are (and have always been) very demanding and quite demeaning. It turns out that Francis, although rather attractive, has always been treated as the oversized, 'ugly duckling' and continually compared to her much prettier, older sister.

Francis, or Fran as she prefers, also has way too much on her plate at work as she has been 'filling in' for another police member on top of her own duties. But she hasn't said anything to anyone about her workload, how tired she is from driving 200 km down to Devon to her disagreeable parents' dirty cottage every weekend, often only getting back in time to walk into work. On top of which she is suffering from menopausal flushes and bouts of tearfulness – usually at inappropriate moments.

There appears to be an attraction growing between Fran and her immediate boss and long term friend, Mark Turner, who very quickly realises what's going on in Fran's life (although he wonders why he didn't see it sooner).

Mark pulls strings and organises Fran to be in sole charge of a two year old case that has gone very cold so that she can lighten her workload, cope with her parents and try to balance the two while working out what she is going to do about the latter and her 'impending' retirement.

The cold case is a women, Elise, in a coma in hospital

for 2 years with the doctors pressing to turn off her life support. She was found in bushes, on the side of a road in an unsavoury area, severely beaten about the head and raped very badly. The police have got nowhere in the two years.

Alan Pitt, the man who found and tried to resuscitate Elise, visits her frequently in hospital and talks to her all the time. His behaviour is odd, to say the least.

Then a child, Rebecca, is abducted and Fran's focus has to shift very smartly to the current incident.

She has a gut feeling that the two events are related although she doesn't see how; she has a gut feeling that Alan Pitt is more than unusual and is somehow involved in Rebecca's abduction.

So Fran continues to work out what's going on in each of her cases, finally recruits her older sister to help out with her parents, becomes increasingly romantically involved with Mark (and may as well because the whole police department thinks they are together anyway), continues to mentor her protégé and struggles to remain calm with a new, young, rude superior brought in to temporarily cover the gap she had been filling for another.

I enjoyed this novel, not just for the 'whodunnit' aspect but because it was nice to read that romance still occurs for middle aged people, especially woman in the throes of menopause. It was nice to read Fran and Mark's personal doubts and thoughts whirling around in their heads as they try to figure out their attraction to the other, if the other is attracted to them and what to do about it.

Handle antibiotics With Care

Antibiotic resistance — What is it and why is it a problem?

What is antibiotic resistance?

Antibiotic resistance happens when bacteria change to protect themselves from an antibiotic. They are then no longer sensitive to that antibiotic. When this happens antibiotics that previously would have killed the bacteria, or stopped them from multiplying, no longer work.

What causes antibiotic resistance?

The more antibiotics are used the more chances bacteria have to become resistant to them. Major causes of antibiotic resistance include:

- Using antibiotics when they are not needed
- Not taking antibiotics at the doses and times that a doctor prescribes this allows time for the bacteria in your system to become resistant.

Antibiotics are also often overused in animals (in veterinary medicine and in agriculture).

How does antibiotic resistance affect me?

Using antibiotics when you don't need them may mean that they won't work for you when you do need them in the future.

If you have an antibiotic-resistant bacterial infection:

- You will have the infection for longer
- You may be more likely to have complications of the infection
- You could remain infectious for longer and pass your infection to other people which increases the problem.

You can help prevent antibiotic resistance

Many people think that antibiotics can cure a cold or flu and will help to shorten their illness. This is not true because most respiratory tract infections are caused by viruses, so antibiotics won't have any effect.

You can prevent antibiotic resistance by:

- Understanding that most people don't need antibiotics for colds and flu because they are caused by viruses
- Telling your doctor you only want an antibiotic if it is really necessary
- Taking the right dose of your antibiotic at the right time, as prescribed by your doctor
- Taking your antibiotics for as long as your doctor tells you to
- Taking simple steps to avoid infections and prevent them from spreading.

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

Watch out . . . bugs about!

After being dormant in winter many garden pests and bugs are now on the move. Here are six common garden pests to control.

Bronze orange bug

Watch out for these brightly coloured orange bugs on citrus trees and flowers. They suck the sap from young stems and damage new growth. They give off a bad smelling substance when threatened.

Azalea lace bug

Azalea lace bug (Stephanitis pyrioides) affects azaleas and rhododendrons. These tiny insects feed on the plant's sap causing unsightly mottling. In severe cases it causes leaf-drop or death of the plant. Check for early signs of it on the undersides of leaves in spring.

Mealy bug

These small, fuzzy, white insects distort new growth by sucking on the plants sap and the female's excretions cover leaves with a sticky honey-like substance that attracts ants which in turn provides the right conditions for sooty mould. With the onset of warm weather watch out for these insects on citrus, roses, indoor and outdoor ornamentals.

Citrus leaf miner

Citrus leaf miner (Phyllocnistis citrella) tunnels through the young leaves of citrus trees which creates silvery lines. Finally, it curls the leaf into a shelter and pupates within. This can severely distort the leaves but mature trees are not likely to be seriously damaged. Young trees may need some protection.

Snails & slugs

You will mostly see these slimy creatures early morning or at night.

Two-spotted mite

Two-spotted mite (Tetranychus urticae) affects ornamentals, fruit trees and some vegetables. Affected leaves have a mottled appearance or can be bronzed or shrivelled. Leave them to natural predators.

Homemade Garlic Spray

To make a large quantity of garlic spray follow this recipe: 500g crushed garlic

150-200mls liquid paraffin (just cover garlic)

2.5L water

150g pure soap

- Soak the garlic and paraffin together for 24 48 hours
- Add remaining ingredients and stir thoroughly
- Filter the mixture well (a piece of muslin or tea towel will suffice).
- Store in a glass container (flagon bottles or jars are excellent) away from sunlight.
- Dilute at the rate of 15-30mls of concentrate per 1L of water, depending on use.

Spray when pests are active; for instance, apply spray in the late afternoon or evenings for night-feeding pests.

Bowraville Connections — Stage 1Community Recreation and Sports Precinct

What is it?

A concept for an intergenerational, multi-sport, recreation and leisure facility for the western side of Bowraville; which includes the area from the Preschool, through Hennessy-Tape Oval and amenities, to the Recreation Club.

The current precinct is disjointed and has isolated areas which discourage casual use of facilities. The community has expressed a desire to improve this area and Nambucca Shire Council is working on a response.

What is involved?

Improvements to, and enhancement of, existing facilities with some new construction in a staged approach. The concept includes a modern, central and safe children's playground and family picnic area with easy access and space for cultural storytelling; construction of pathways connecting town and schools with the existing sports facilities and Recreation Club; weed removal; landscaping and revegetation; drinking water stations; picnic tables and seating at the cricket nets.

Other work will include repairs to the skate park, stabilising the retaining wall near the Tiger's Clubhouse/ tennis courts and construction of a river access point. Conversion of 1 tennis court to basketball and construction of a BMX track introduces 2 new recreation options.

At the Recreation Club: new roof, internal improvements and refurbishment of the existing bowling greens. Future development may include additional pathways, primitive camping area and more car parking.

How will we fund the project?

To make the impact needed a large amount of funding is required. Council has submitted an "Expression of Interest" to 2016-2017 NSW Clubs Grants for nearly \$1m. If successful we will be invited to make a formal application. Other sources of funding is welcomed and may be needed.

Where to from here?

Firstly this is a <u>concept</u> and the various components have not been tested for their logic or social, environmental and engineering viability. There may also be clear community reasons not to progress certain elements in their proposed location or at all. More careful scrutiny and community feedback will help refine the Plan.

Also, the Concept plan is a part of a possible future larger project to create improved connections across Bowraville eg from the Canoe Launch near Grassy park, around or across town to this western precinct. The plan should interest the community as it has the potential to incorporate strong environmental and social actions for Bowraville.



When Collecting Becomes Hoarding

Collecting is something many people do as a hobby or just because they like to keep things that remind them of fond memories. People collect everything – from stamps to antiques, cards to their baby's first tooth.

But when does collecting become hoarding? This is a complex question and undoubtedly something that is subjective in many cases. However, for some people, the fact that they collect a lot of things can cause them a range of other problems that have a negative effect on their daily lives.



Hoarding is described as a disorder if someone collects too many things, have difficulty letting go or throwing out things that are no longer needed or wanted and if they have considerable problems with organisation. Often, people who hoard have difficulty moving around their home due to the amount of things they have accumulated inside it or even around the outside of their home. It can also create a situation where the person can no longer maintain their home and keep it clean.

People who hoard often report that they shop excessively in order to acquire more things. This can cause financial difficulties and relationship problems. This compulsive buying has been found to be associated with OCD and depression. Even though the person may be aware that they have too many things the thought of throwing things away, giving them away or recycling them is too difficult.

The accumulation of things throughout the home causes many problems and people who hoard have difficulty organising their home in a way that helps them to live a normal life. Often their home contains piles of things which contain both useful and worthless items together, making it difficult for them to find things and move around comfortably. The task of locating things that they do need becomes extremely time consuming.

The three C's is a simple way of looking at the stages of acquisition:

Clutter - Some people are disturbed by small amounts of disorganisation or disorder, others thrive in the midst of a 'creative mess'. What matters is: Are the things being used? And can the owner get rid of things easily?



Myffie Coady's next art exhibition "Momenty" will be at beautiful Gladstone from 1st November to 13th November



Clots - Clots are when collections of clutter aren't used or moved for 6 months or more. The household still works, the rooms can still be entered and lived in but there are 'dead' places. Touching clots or moving them can provoke the same cries and panic that hoarders have when their things are touched or moved. *Examples:* a laundry pile that is never completely folded or put away; bags or boxes created after a sort out but have never made it out the door to the charity shop or the rubbish bin; collecting fabric for a quilt, cutting the first bits, then not touching it again for 5 years; unwanted purchases in their original packaging which have sat so long they can not be returned.

Clogs

Clogs are when clots all over the house become stuck to one another. For example a spare room can become a dumping ground - all the clots described above have been carried into the spare room and left. Eventually it is impossible to open the door or get into the room. The possessions are no longer being used. The person is now serving their things rather than the other way around.

Recovery

Primarily, treatment for hoarding involves cognitive-behavioural therapy (CBT) with similar aspects to that used to treat OCD. CBT has been shown to be successful in treating people who hoard with recovery rates reported to be up to 80%. Group therapy can also be helpful as this reduces feelings of isolation and shame associated with hoarding behaviours and can even help motivate the person to seek individual treatment. Group therapy can help people develop their own skills and understand

the emotions and thoughts associated with their disorder. Self-help and peersupport groups such as on-line support groups can also be helpful in reducing feelings of isolation and help to increase the person's self-esteem through sharing stories and skills which are helpful in the recovery process.


