A report by The Australian Communications and Media Authority found about 55 per cent of the total population had heard of cloud computing and only 26 per cent of active cloud computer users were aware they had used the cloud.

Confusion — or maybe ignorance — about cloud computing isn't new. Actually, there's confusion about where cloud computing even came from.

The MIT Technology Review, which investigated various claims about the origins of the phrase, blames Google — or at least Google CEO Eric Schmidt who said, eight years ago: "It starts with the premise that the data services and architecture should be on servers. We call it cloud computing — they should be in a "cloud" somewhere."

Thanks for that, Mr Schmidt.

So, what is cloud computing? PC Mag put it well when it called it "a metaphor for the internet" — although it's not quite that either.

In simple terms using cloud computing means storing your files on a place that is not your local hard drive.

Why would you use the cloud? Back in the day if you were at work and you wanted to use a file that was on your home computer, basically you were buggered.

(Yes, you could ring up your partner and talk them through finding the file or you could connect to your computer using remote connection software — but "you were buggered" is a better general description.)

People got around that by carrying their files on floppy disks. The problem with that is that files got very big and floppy disks were pretty inconvenient (and, also, not always floppy).

That led to other solutions such as Zip drives (like floppy disks but less convenient) and USB sticks. But still there are problems with having one version of a file on a portable drive and potentially different versions of that file on different computers.

By storing that file on a cloud service, such as Google Drive, no matter where you are you're always able to access that file (assuming you have access to the internet).



You also don't have to worry about backups because the cloud service does the back-up for you.

With people having multiple devices connected to the internet one of the advantages of using the cloud is that you access the same file across all of your devices.

Let's say you're going on a holiday to Paris. Lucky you.

Using a computer you log onto the website www.tripit.com and put in your flight details. Then when you're at the airport you can check the itinerary using your smartphone or tablet.

So, do you use cloud services? Yes, you probably do.

The most common cloud-based system that people use is webmail such as gmail.

If you have an iPad or iPhone then the photos you take are also (assuming you have turned on cloud services) stored on Apple's cloud which, naturally, is called the iCloud.

If you don't have an iPad or iPhone and saw Windows 8 as a step forward in operating systems on Windows 7 (really, what were you thinking?), then you might have your files stored on Microsoft OneDrive.

If you use a Kindle then the book you are reading is stored in the cloud. You've put holiday photos on Flickr? That's the cloud.

Has someone, wanting to send you a large file, emailed you a link from Dropbox? Well, you've used cloud computing too.

If you're still struggling to get your head around the cloud the thing to know is that it's not one cloud. It's a bunch of clouds and each of those clouds is a different service.

The Jealous Kind by James Lee Burke

This novel, set in Houston in the summer of 1952, has a very twisted plot, many characters and lots of violence.

1950s Houston, USA is a time of souped up cars, drive-in restaurants, mob rule, blues and jazz music and also when there is a right and wrong 'side of the track'; ethnic



groups who are unaccepted by the mainstream and don't get along with each other; little excuse needed for violent interaction; communities with shortage of jobs and low wages; a distinct division between those with an education and those without.

The main character, seventeen year old Aaron Holland Broussard, intervenes in an argument between the very beautiful, teenage Valerie Epstein and her slightly older boyfriend Grady Harrelson. Valerie dumps Grady on the spot and Aaron's life changes forever.

Grady, a nasty spoilt kid with a rich father and both with unsavoury friends, cannot let this go and wants Aaron punished. It seems that most of the teenagers, including Aaron's best friend Saber. come from dysfunctional families mothers with psychological problems, fathers who fought in wars and each now handling their own personal aftermath in whatever way they can (often involving too much alcohol), violent and/or mob connected relatives, strict parents, violent parents, secretive parents - some with twisted minds and deviant behaviours. At least one of the school teachers is a fairly nasty piece of work; some of the local cops are corrupt and cannot be relied upon to do their job....

In such an unstable environment, while Aaron is experiencing his first love, it is no surprise that when he discovers he's been drawn into something much larger than a disagreement between 2 teenage lads, involving not just Grady and his mob connected mate, Vick Atlas, but drugs, money, murder..... he also learns who he can and cannot trust and that ultimately he must rely on himself.

I enjoyed this very 'busy' novel – there is a lot going on and many twists and turns. I found it a little difficult to believe that a 17 year old could have thought processes like Aaron and that he could be so resourceful but perhaps that's what made this novel (for me anyway) so different to many of those in this genre.

Some facts about Glaucoma?

Introduction

Glaucoma is a disease of the optic nerve which is usually associated with high pressure inside the eye. Glaucoma has been labelled the "sneak thief of sight" because many people remain undiagnosed until irreversible vision loss occurs.

In Australia 300,000 people have glaucoma with projections forecasting this figure to rise to 400,000 by 2025 due to our ageing population.

Causes

The front part of the eye is filled with a clear fluid called 'aqueous humor'. This fluid is continuously produced and constantly flows out of the eye maintaining a steady pressure. If the fluid fails to flow out of the eye properly the pressure will increase causing glaucoma.

Types of Glaucoma

Primary or chronic open angle glaucoma is the most common kind with two thirds of cases presenting with this type. It occurs when the 'drainage angle' (the area where the fluid leaves the eye) appears to be open but does not function properly and pressure within the eye increases.

Occasionally the drainage angle of the eye may become narrow and close gradually, this is called chronic angle closure. If the drainage angle closes suddenly it is called acute angle closure.

Acute angle closure glaucoma causes severe sudden pressure rise and is typically painful with the development of redness. Vision may become blurred and halos may be seen around bright lights. Other symptoms can include headaches, nausea and vomiting. Chronic angle closure leads to gradual pressure however, does not respond well to standard medicine such as eye drops.

Symptoms

Raised eye pressure cannot be felt unless it quickly becomes noticeably elevated as in acute angle closure glaucoma. Most patients are therefore unaware they have glaucoma. The symptoms for acute angle glaucoma are mentioned above.

Diagnosis

Regular eye examinations are the best way to detect glaucoma. An examination will measure the fluid pressure, examine the drainage angle, test the visual fields and examine the optic nerve. The test will take 20-45 mins and is conducted by an ophthalmologist.

Risk Factors

Research suggests that some factors may increase the risk of glaucoma developing including; age, family history, past injuries to the eye, other eye diseases, high eye pressure, near-sighted or myopic patients.

Treatment

Eye drops, oral medication, and/or surgery are used to treat the different types of Glaucoma. An ophthalmologist can decide which treatment option is best suited to you.

Surgery

The most common operation is a Trabeculectomy. This procedure creates a new drainage channel for fluid to leave the eye and is performed in an operating theatre using a microscope. Local anaesthetic is usually used but occasionally a general may be preferred. Patients leave the hospital on the day of surgery and are followed up closely. The surgery is 90% effective, however, like all surgery there are risks involved.

Laser surgery

Laser surgery is effective in different types of glaucoma. This is a painless procedure performed as an outpatient and comes with minimal side effects. Local anaesthetic eye drops are given and a special instrument is placed on the surface of the eye to hold the eyelids open.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding any aspect of glaucoma treatment, please discuss these with an ophthalmologist.

Pot plant gardens: balcony, entryway, pathway

Pot plants need a little extra care, including repotting every few years and frequent fertiliser and watering but with a little effort you can ensure your plants thrive year around.

A good-quality potting mix is essential for potted plants. Look for a premium-grade mix or one designed specifically for the kind of plants you intend to grow. In pots plants are solely dependent on what you put into the pots for nutrients so a regular schedule for fertilising and watering is essential.

Consider edging your balcony or entrance walkway with raised planter boxes. In full sun positions these can be great for easy-to-pick edibles like strawberries, passionfruit and tomatoes. Or opt for a fragrant selection of lavender, sweet pea, gardenia or rose.

Even in pots keep height in mind. Consider stacking smaller pots inside larger ones to create a tiered look, like for a strawberry tower or a layered planter. For stacking displays opt for plastic or thinner pots. This allows plenty of room

for potting mix, which the roots need, and helps reduce the weight of the finished planter.

To add variety in one larger pot by including a selection of groundcovers with low and medium height plants. Creating



your own seasonal planter is fun, easy and saves money.

Food Pots

If you have the environment in mind consider growing some of your food in a vegie or kitchen pot-plant garden. Herbs, tomatoes, eggplant, strawberries, raspberries, garlic, onions, peas, capsicum, chillies, zucchinis bred specifically for pots and even certain varieties of citrus plants can be grown in pots. You might consider growing food or flowers from heirloom seeds to maximise biodiversity which the bees and butterflies will love.

Plants or vegies in smaller pots can easily be moved to catch as much sun as possible as the sun's path changes over the course of a day or season. Set pots on rolling bases to make this easy.

Is your smartphone use affecting your children?

Emerging trends in digital technologies such as smart phones, tablets and wearable communication devices are becoming the norm for a majority of families.

Parents and children alike seem to be addicted to their devices.

While studies have been showing us how the use of digital devices affect adults, more studies have shown us how excessive use of digital devices impact children's health and wellbeing. But few studies have shown us how parental use of digital devices affect children and their behaviour.

Researchers from the University of Michigan C.S. Mott Children's Hospital (Mott) in Ann Arbor and Illinois State University in Normal set out to examine this.

Previous studies have found a correlation between parental

technology use and poor parent-child interaction but for the first time, this study examines the effect on child behaviour.

The interference cause by technology on parent-child relation is coined as "technoference" by one of the researchers. Such interference may occur during face-to-face conversations or during routines such as mealtimes and playtimes. It refers to the perception of interruption one feels when another person interacts with digital technology during their time together and has even affected adult romantic relationships leading to conflict and poorer relationship satisfaction.

To examine the relationship between "technoference" and child behaviour the researchers examined reports from 170 two-parent U.S. families whose children were just over 3 years old, on average.

The researchers assessed parent digital technology use using a three-item self-report scale adapted from prior studies of problematic mobile phone use while perceived "technoference" in the mother–child relationship and in the father–child relationship was assessed through mother and father self-reports.

The researchers asked parents about the use of various digital devices and looked to see how these devices interrupted time spent with the family – from checking texts during dinner and playtime and other activities to conversations parents engage in with their children.

Parents were also asked to rate their children's behaviours over the past two months and to report the numbers of times their children sulked, whined, showed signs of hyperactivity, were irritable and became easily frustrated.

After adjusting for various factors such as stress and depression in parents including income levels, level of education and quality of co-parenting, the study found that parents admitted that technology interfered with their interaction with children at least once a day.

Overall, most parents admitted that technology routinely interrupted their interactions with their children at least once every day.

Furthermore, 17 per cent of participants reported 'technoference' occurred 1 time, 24 per cent reported 2 times and 48 per cent reported 3 or more times of 'technoference' on a typical day.

Only 11 per cent of the parents said that 'technoference' did not occur.

The study further revealed that even low amount of 'technoference' correlated with higher child behaviour issues such as oversensitivity, irritability, hyperactivity, whining and more child screen time.

The findings of this study draws light on growing dysfunctional relationships between parents and their children due to technology use and while parents may find it relaxing to get on their smartphones or tablets during family time it is affecting children and how they feel and behave.

Perhaps parents need to set "no screen times" during which they can focus completely on their children and give them the time and attention they need to grow healthily and happily.

IT HAPPENED IN BOWRA IN THE MID-1870s!

AN OLD MYSTERY SOLVED Cedar log and trucks recovered

Last week the dredge *Iota* brought up in her grabs from the river bottom in the upper reach of the Nambucca two badly *cobra-eaten bullock trucks and solved a mystery that has defied penetration for over 30 years.

In the mid-seventies a timber-getter named Thomas Cook, who also owned a bullock team, hauled a cedar log on two trucks to a wharf known as Sullivan's Point near Bowraville and left them there awaiting the arrival of the **drogher. Shortly afterwards a rise in the river occurred but only lasted for a few days. When the water subsided the log and trucks had disappeared and although diligent search was made not the slightest trace could be found of them.

Cook ridiculed the idea that a flood had swept away his property and pointed out that the log, a giant cedar, was heavy enough to anchor a ship. He was confident the log and trucks had been stolen and believed that sooner or later he would catch the thief. But this hope was never fulfilled for death overtook him whilst the problem was still unsolved. And it remained so until last week.

The trucks when hauled from the river were chained together as is usually the case when they are employed in drawing logs. The wooden wheels had been riddled by cobra and the ironwork had almost completely rusted away. By their appearance they must have been fully 30 years in the water. Old hands have identified them as Cook's property and are inclined to believe that the cedar log was stolen and shipped away, and to conceal the crime the trucks were thrown into the river at the place where they were recently recovered.

The custom of setting aside a day for the playing of harmless pranks upon one's neighbour is recognised widely throughout the world but there seems to be some confusion about its origins.

In 1508, French poet Eloy d'Amerval referred to a *poisson d'avril* (literally "fish of April"), a possible reference to the holiday. In 1686, John Aubrey referred to the holiday as "fooles holy day", the first British reference. On April 1, 1698 several people were tricked into going to the Tower of London to "see the Lions washed".

In the Middle Ages New Year's Day was celebrated on March 25 in most European towns. In some areas of France New Year's was a week-long holiday ending on April 1. Some writers suggest that April Fools' originated because those who celebrated on January 1 made fun of those who celebrated on other dates.

In the UK an April fool joke is revealed by shouting "April fool!" at the recipient who becomes the "April fool" but traditionally this ends at midday. A person playing a joke after midday is the "April fool" themselves.
