Google . . . 20 years on How the search engine changed the world



- it's so big, it's become a verb – as in "just Google it". Where would we be without it today? Google kicked off in 1998 at a time when not everyone was on the internet and the way we discovered new sites was word of mouth from other connected friends with the address scribbled on a scrap of paper.

Then Google came along and suddenly the world was at our fingertips. That immediate access has changed the world and changed lives. It has also made Google one of the richest companies in the world.

When Google kicked off 20 years ago the goal was to organise all the information that was out there and make it easily accessible. That was a huge task back then even though the web in 1998 was made up of just 25 million pages.

Today Google is indexing hundreds of billions of pages which is more information than all the books a library can hold. Google Search is available in more than 150 languages and more than 190 countries.

Over the years the size of Google's task has grown but the basic principles are still there with the focus on the user and whatever it is they happen to be looking for whether it's a recipe, the nearest Thai restaurant or the capital of Malta.

The other challenge for Google is also providing you with the most relevant and highest quality information as quickly as possible. This is where Google's PageRank algorithm comes in and is still the foundation of Search today. One interesting tidbit – Google processes billions of queries every day but 15 per cent have never been seen before.

So the algorithm needs to work both ways – solve the queries they saw yesterday and the ones they can't anticipate for tomorrow.

As Google marks its 20th anniversary what is the next chapter of Search? The answer is three fundamental shifts in how we think about Search.

- The shift from answers to journeys: To help you resume tasks where you left off and explore new interests and hobbies, Google is bringing new features to Search that help you with ongoing information needs.

- The shift from queries to providing a queryless way to get to information: Google can surface relevant information related to your interests so you can stay informed and inspired even when you don't have a specific query in mind.

- And the shift from text to a more visual way of finding information: Google is bringing more visual content to Search and completely redesigning Google Images to help you find information more easily.

And what lies beneath all three of these new areas is AI (Artificial Inteligence) and we've reached a point where neural networks can help Google take a major leap in the way it processes information.

But providing access to that information is what has driven Google for 20 years and what will keep driving them for the next 20 years and beyond as well.

THE SONG KEEPERS tells the uplifting story of women from the world's oldest culture preserving some of the world's oldest sacred songs.



Echoing this year's theme for NAIDOC week, 'Because of her, we can', *THE SONG KEEPERS* looks at a hidden 140-year musical legacy of ancient Aboriginal languages and German baroque hymns being preserved by four generations of song women who form the Central Australian Aboriginal Women's Choir.

Singing 14th-century Lutheran hymns – brought to the area by missionaries – in their own western Arrarnta and Pitjantjatjara tongues, the choir's efforts to save these sacred songs are boosted by the arrival from Melbourne of a charismatic conductor who orchestrates a historic tour of Germany to bring the hymns back to their homeland.

Together these remarkable women take their music and stories of cultural survival, identity and cross-cultural collaboration to the world.

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Runner by Thomas Perry

I enjoyed this novel. It's set in America and tells the story of Jane Whitefield, an intelligent, beautiful, resourceful Native American woman. She is married to a doctor and has no children.

It's five years since she assisted anyone fleeing from their enemies,

partners, lives etc. Jane helped these "Runners" escape, created new identities for them, helped them get set up elsewhere in America using a network of others whose skills she required (eg forgers), teaching them what they need to know to survive as a new person and promising never to reveal their whereabouts. Jane is retired from that life; a promise to her husband not to return to it.

When a bomb goes off at a hospital fundraiser she finds herself being asked for help by a young pregnant woman (Christine) who is being tracked across the country by a team of hunters. Without thinking she says yes....

And the adventure starts there. The reader

must guess early on (and correctly so) that it's the father of the baby chasing Christine. He's obviously got money, influence and contacts if he can afford to send 6 people after her. His reasons for doing so come a little later.

Despite not having great geographical knowledge of USA or it's highways and airports I think you'll get the idea of the country's vastness and time and effort it takes to travel such distances. It's not a joyride. It will make you think about what you'd have to do to disappear and start a new life again with a new identity.

Scary....to me it felt true; that *Perry* is telling someone's real life experience (which I didn't really like) but we all know this story <u>is</u> someone's real experience; it happens all too often.

Heart Disease - Australia's biggest killer

What is Heart Disease?

The heart is a muscular pump that pumps blood around the body. In most people it beats at least once every second and must sustain this for the duration of our life. Considering this phenomenal workload it is not surprising that it can be prone to failure with disastrous consequences. Sadly, this occurs in one Australian every 12 minutes.

Heart disease is a disturbance in the heart's function and typically arises from one of these problems:

1. Impaired blood supply to the heart muscle (Coronary Heart Disease) – the coronary blood vessels supply the heart muscle with oxygen and nutrients. If these vessels are narrowed (eg due to cholesterol deposits in coronary artery disease) the blood supply will be reduced and chest pain may occur. If a vessel is completely blocked that part of the heart is deprived of oxygen and will die (called a heart attack or myocardial infarction). If more than one-third of the heart muscle dies during a heart attack the impact is fatal.

2. Reduced Pumping (Heart Failure) – this may be due to the weaknesses in the heart muscle itself (eg cardiomyopathy) or a problem with the heart valves (valvular heart disease).

3. Abnormal heart beat (Cardiac Arrhythmia) – this may be a heart beat that is too slow (heart block) or too fast (tachycardia) both of which reduce the heart's efficiency.

Are you at risk?

Heart disease remains the largest single cause of death in Australia and accounts for 34% of male and 39% of female deaths. There are a number of conditions which increase the risk of heart disease such as diabetes, anxiety and depression as well as lifestyle risk factors including high blood pressure, high cholesterol, high body mass index, physical inactivity, smoking, alcohol and low fruit and vegetable intake.



By being aware of these risk factors for heart

disease and choosing to lead a fit and healthy lifestyle you can reduce your risk of heart disease dramatically.

IT HAPPENED in BOWRA in 1913

School life around Christmas 1913 ARGENT'S HILL



Last-Monday evening at the Argents Hill Hall the scholars of the Public School assisted by several local friends gave a Christmas Concert. There was a large attendance of parents and friends who appreciated the various items of the programme. Mr. W. Scrivener, President of the Parents and Citizens Association, occupied the chair.

The evening's entertainment was opened by the rendering of Christmas songs by the pupils of the school. This and several other items rendered by the children reflect great credit upon the master, Mr. J. Barnes. The dumbell exercises by a squad of boys, who, owing to the limited space on the platform, were unable to be seen to an advantage, nevertheless, was a very creditable display. The flag exercises by the girls, was also very good.

There was an elocution competition amongst the scholars in which competed, 9 boys and 4 girls. Recitations were of the competitors' own choice. On the whole, the young people did very well and gave the adjudicator, Mr. D. G. Walker, some work in arriving at his decision, which finally went to Master Scrivener. With proper tuition this lad should make a fine elocutionist. He possesses a wonderful power of imagination, and was able to give the audience a capital idea of the piece he was reciting. Ethel Lewis gained the judge's decision amongst the girls. She gave a fine rendering of a piece entitled "Only a Working Girl."

Some of the ladies and gentlemen assisted with the programme. A Trio by the Argent Bros and Mr. Barnes entitled "A Little Farm Well Tilled" caused much amusement and they had to respond with an encore. *Nambucca and Bellinger News*

The Most Photographed Generation Will Have No Pictures in 10 Years!

They're everywhere. In your phone, on your tablet, you have your point-n-shoot, and maybe even a DSLR. A few might even own a film camera. You can't escape the selfies, Instagram, Pinterest and Facebook. People are deluged with photographs. And today people are taking more pictures than ever before. It's been estimated that in the past 5 years more photos have been taken than all the prior years combined.

The sad part is that few of these photographs will survive beyond a year. To many people a "picture" is only good for the moment. Mums and Dads want to snap every little movement of that new baby and Grandma wants to see all of those too. When you want to show off the new puppy you pull out the phone. And in a week none of them have any real meaning and might even get "deleted" to make room for more pictures that will have little meaning.

So what will become of all the pictures that are being taken today? Here is the reason that 99% of the photographs being taken today are soon going to be totally gone – digital images are no longer important enough to most people to actually keep them in printed form!

Not so long ago we bought a roll of film and took our vacation photographs. We had them developed and printed. They were put in photo albums or photo boxes. We looked at them and cherished those memories with great care. They were a slice of our life and for many, if disaster struck, those photographs were the one thing we would try to find first. Wedding and baby albums and photographs represented our life.

It is estimated that less that 1 out of 100,000 photographs taken today actually ends up being a printed photograph. The digital world means you look at those pictures on either a phone, tablet or computer screen but unless you print them they are useless. You probably have countless pictures that are just randomly stored and have no organization or way to locate them. Perhaps you have made some effort but even that can seem overwhelming when you decide to tackle the task.

Add to this, over the years, the technology has changed so fast that many photographs taken 6-7 years ago are stored on a type of media that is no longer supported. In not too many years your DVD will be obsolete as will USB drives. File types will change as well. And the technology of tomorrow may not support these "older" file types.

Maybe you "shared" some on Facebook or Instagram or uploaded to your photo storage website. But none of these are "permanent" solutions to viewing your photos and sadly, many of the memories you captured today, aren't going to be around tomorrow. There

NSW Christmas Bush Ceratopetalum gummiferum

One plant that's always perfectly dressed to celebrate an Aussie Christmas is the New South Wales Christmas bush. In early summer this shapely native shrub's small creamy-white flowers give way to showy red or pink bracts. Together with pretty, shiny, soft foliage it's no wonder this plant is a florist favourite during the festive season. The best time to pick your favourite variety is when the calyx ripens and colours brightly, between November and December.

Popular varieties include 'Albery's Red', a large shrub which delivers dependably bright red flowers and 'Red, Red, Red Christmas' boasts bracts that turn a darker shade of red as they age. While the dwarf 'Johanna's Christmas' stays up to three metres in height and width.

Height: 3–6 metres **Width:** 1.8–3 metres **Ideal spot**: In full sun or partly shaded it prefers a sandy, well-draining soil so if you have clay soil make sure to dig through gypsum and a good garden mix will do better if protected from wind.

Where to grow: In a pot or in the ground.

Feed: After pruning in January/ February mulch with well-rotted compost or manure plus a dressing of blood and bone and water well. A scattering of sulphate of iron (100g per plant) around the plant followed by a good watering, may improve the colour next season.

Prune: Lightly in Jan or Feb or as soon as the display of red bracts has finished. Cut large sprays for an amazing indoor display. For dense flowering wood next season prune flowering new wood only. Do not cut into old or hard wood.

Protect: Leaf-curling psyllids and scale can attack NSW Christmas bush. Spray with *eco-oil* or white oil.

Watering: Water regularly in spring and summer.

The different types of friendships?



Rarely does a person go from virtual stranger to instant best friends. Friendships develop as each person reveals a little bit more about herself and the 'friend-in-the-making' matches the self-disclosure with disclosures of her own. It's how trust is built between people – through mutual sharing of increasingly intimate or personal information. In fact research has revealed

that it takes about 50 hours' worth of face time for a mere acquaintance to become a casual friend then 90 hours to upgrade to the status of a standard friend. Then it takes about 200 additional hours of interaction for a "close friendship" to develop!

Before we get into the nitty-gritty of the types of individual friends it's important to note that we as individuals prefer different types of social structures. **Tightknitters** tend to maintain a dense social network where everyone is friends with each other; whereas **compartmentalisers** have multiple cluster groups of friends, which often hail from different time periods in their life or serve different functions, like advice or entertainment. **Samplers** have one-on-one friendships but steer clear of groups.

There are four core types of friendship: **acquaintance**, **friend**, **close friend** and **best friend**. The level of friendship deepens as the level of reciprocity and mutual respect and affection grow. Acquaintances are easy enough to categorise. They're the people who aren't complete strangers, who you run into regularly at a place like the coffee shop or work cafeteria, but you don't really know. They are people we know well enough to make small talk with on a regular basis but not really people we'd invite to a dinner party or call on if we needed assistance.

By contrast, standard-issue "friends" are those that we try to run into or mix with. The women that you share carpool duties with for kids' sports and that you usually hang out with or spend time with at the games, for instance. Or people that are your 'crowd' and the ones that you tend to socialise with on a regular basis.

These buddies are certainly valuable but when the going gets rough you're more likely to reach out to a "close friend" for help or support. They're also the people you trade secrets with. There's not just a strong level of trust between these friends, there's also a whole lot of unconditional regard and affinity. You may not like a close friend's choices but you'd defend her/his right to make them.

Last but not least is the truly few and far between phenomenon of the "best friend." Best friends are the rarest type of friend and the kind of friend that we all need to have in our lives. It's the friend who gets you without you having to explain yourself. It's the type of friend who loves you no matter what. And they're not necessarily people you talk to every day. "You might go weeks or months without connecting but when you do re-connect it's as if no time has passed at all." These friendships are different in their ability to flex and endure even if life temporarily gets in the way. These are 'heart-to-heart' or 'soul friends' and they

What is it about . . . Mistletoe?

Mistletoe is most popularly known through its place in ancient legends and mythology and its widespread use in folk medicine. To the naturalist, however, its fascination stems from its unusual life history and its interactions with other plants and animals. To the biologist, in recent years, it has become a useful tool in research and studies of mistletoe have contributed in a variety of ways to our knowledge of plant evolution. Research on mistletoes has furthered understanding of the origins of southern hemisphere vegetation, the evolution of mimicry in plants, the development of sexual differentiation or dioecy in plants and, of course, the biology of parasitism.



Superstitions about mistletoe are widespread in many cultures in different parts of the world and therefore involve numerous mistletoe species. Even in this wider context mistletoe is more often a good omen than a bad one. Uses for mistletoe, which often involved special recipes and complicated rituals, include gaining protection from fires, keeping witches away, as a divining rod to find hidden treasure, keeping horses from straying, promoting fertility in domestic herds and crops, giving strength to wrestlers, success to hunters, avoiding military service, protecting from wounds in battle, forcing evil spirits from hiding and making them tell the truth, preventing nightmares, providing refuge for woodland spirits in winter and keeping witches from meat in the smokehouse.

Mistletoe was used medicinally either by placing it on the affected part or by drinking a decoction of the plant. At various times in various parts of the world it has been used to treat epilepsy, the bites of mad dogs and wild animals, strained muscles, toothache, sores, itch, weakness of vision, impetigo, dandruff, regeneration of lost fingernails, common cold, ulcers, poisoning, promotion of muscular relaxation before childbirth, to hasten menstruation, treat warts, snakebite, fever, syphilis, beri-beri, ringworm, headaches, gout and worms.

In Australia the indigenous people certainly recognised mistletoes and had specific names for them. It seems, however, that mistletoes have little place in cultural beliefs. It has been reported some Torres Strait Islanders believe that a pregnant woman who touches mistletoe will have twins.

There was much ceremony attached to collecting mistletoe; several cultural groups, including the Romans and some present-day people, believed that mistletoe was only effective if it was not allowed to touch the ground. The Swiss shot the mistletoe down from oak trees with bow and arrow; the moon had to be on the wane, the sun in the sign of Sagittarius, and the mistletoe twigs had to be caught in the left hand. In other cases, however, mistletoe must not be touched by hand while being collected.

The reason for the importance of mistletoe in legend and medicine probably relates to the growth habit of the plant. Being a parasite, and therefore appearing as a distinct clump of foliage on a tree, it would have attracted the attention of primitive people. Because mistletoe is evergreen it would have been even more conspicuous when observed in winter on a deciduous host tree. Furthermore it would have had special significance when the host tree itself was sacred.

It was widely believed, then, that the evergreen mistletoe kept the deciduous sacred host

tree alive during winter while it was leafless. The mistletoe was regarded as the heart or the life of the god of the sacred tree.

It is noteworthy that the medicinal properties of mistletoe may not be due entirely to superstitious beliefs. In the twentieth century mistletoe became an accepted pharmaceutical plant. Extracts from V. *album* have been reported to have the properties of reducing blood pressure, increasing urine production, toning cardiac muscle, checking haemorrhages, and acting as an antispasmodic (*cf*. its ancient use as a treatment for epilepsy).

Year 10 Agriculture - An Introduction to Beekeeping





As part of Year 10 Agriculture, students have to choose an agricultural enterprise and research it. This year, three students identified that they would be interested in learning about bees. On Tuesday, 11th September, three students, Zeth Grace, Ethan Davidson and Matthew Williamson-Roe as well as Ag Teacher Ms.Wilson and Farm Assistant, Sharon Aitkins all attended Little Star Bee Sanctuary to undertake 'The Introduction to Beekeeping Course'.

After an in-depth discussion regarding the advantages and disadvantages of GPS and a few stops to ask directions after a GPS failure, we arrived at Little Star Bee Sanctuary, nestled into the hillside of the Missabotti Valley. We were met by our Instructor Steve and his wife Trudy. We introduced ourselves to the other participants and settled in for the day to begin our learning journey.

We listened attentively as Steve introduced us to his philosophy on natural beekeeping and outlined what we would be learning throughout the day. We learnt about the different lifecycles of the bees and were shown how a Langstroth Beehive works and is assembled.

Steve discussed the health of bees in Australia and how pests and disease are one of the biggest threats to the beekeeping industry.
