Bowraville Technology Centre . . . when, why, how and NOW!

Not so many years ago to visit Centrelink people had to go into Nambucca Heads and access to a computer and the Internet or get some technology help or have something photocopied was hard to come by.

In 2000 a group of Bowraville business people and local community members got together and decided to see if they could come up with a way to address this problem. At that time grants were available to service remote, under-privileged towns. Though Bowraville did not really fit the 'remote' model this enthusiastic group went ahead with applications and our local National Party member, Luke Hartsuyker, supported us in Parliament resulting in the group obtaining 2 grants; one from the State Government to set up a Community Technology Centre (CTC) and one from the Federal Government to acquire premises to run a Rural Transaction Centre (RTC). In September 2001 the Bowraville Technology Centre (BTC) became a registered entity and opened for business in a room in the building that is now Dr Guard's surgery. In 2002 the Banana Coast Credit Union (BCU) was looking to sell their building and it was decided to purchase the building with the Federal Government grant and encourage the BCU to remain open in Bowraville as part of the RTC services. On its purchase this building became the property of the community of Bowraville through the BTC so the more we use it the better.

The BTC is run by two part time workers and a group of seven volunteers. Its services, which started off as a computer and internet access centre, now include a Centrelink access point, an ATO assist point and offers a great variety of office services including printing, photocopying, faxing, laminating, banners, a Techo Club and most recently a Book Nook or Community Library where people can borrow and donate books. The BTC also produces this community newsletter which is printed by Bowraville Central School and manages the community web site at bowraville.nsw.au. It also does computer servicing including software cleanups.

The BTC has not received any government operational grant funding for over 12 years. The NSW Government recently declined to provide support funding to all similar centres across NSW. Times have been hard and the BTC has to charge for all its services except Centrelink and ATO assist although it does provide a lot of free technology advice and assistance to the community. The Board of the BTC, staff and volunteers, have battled to keep the Centre financially viable. The volunteers are what keeps the BTC functioning and the service available for all of Bowraville as we do not have the funds to pay full time employees. There were over 90 CTCs around NSW in 2004 - now they are reduced to 45 and they are all struggling to stay open.

So appreciate what we have in Bowraville and maybe even volunteer - you never know what extra skills you may pick up and you also get to meet and help many people from the community. By using the BTC and its services you help keep it open and available for a range of technology assistance.

A new Community Recycling Centre for paints, oils, batteries, gas bottles and other household problem wastes in Coffs Harbour is now open for business following a \$48,000 grant from the NSW Government's Waste Less, Recvcle More initiative. Located at the Coffs Coast Resource Recovery Park, Englands Road, the Community Recycling Centre will be open between 7:30am and 5:00pm Monday to Friday and 8:00am to 4:00pm on weekends. The centre accepts the following problem wastes: waterbased and oil-based paints, used motor and cooking oils, lead-acid and hand-held batteries, gas cylinders & fire extinguishers, conventional tube and compact fluorescent lamps, smoke detectors, e-waste and household chemicals.



Red Leaves, in New England, USA, is the name of a home for young pregnant girls. Kristina, a 20 year old student attending university nearby, has a part-time job at Red Leaves.

She's tall, beautiful, intelligent and the most talented female basketballer at her uni. Her closest friends Albert, Connie and Jim are from privileged backgrounds and they all spend a lot of time together

Love your Liver - World Hepatitis Day - 28th July

Globally, the impact of hepatitis B and hepatitis C is staggering. The World Health Organisation (WHO) estimates that about 400 million people have chronic viral hepatitis worldwide.

In Australia approximately 218,000 people are living with chronic hepatitis B and more than 226,000 Australians are living with chronic hepatitis C.

Hepatitis means inflammation of the liver – from any cause. Hepatitis C is transmitted via blood to blood contact and unlike other common hepatitis viruses A and B, there is no vaccine available to protect against hepatitis C. Prevention strategies, managing symptoms and reducing the risk of liver damage are critical.



The liver is our largest internal organ – and in some ways, the most complex.

There are many very good reasons why we should look after our liver but generally we do not treat it well. Instead, we constantly put it under stress, with alcohol being one of the worst offenders. Other medicines (including complementary and alternative medicines) and substances also have the potential to cause liver problems.

Love your Liver was launched in 2011 by Hepatitis Australia. It is a 5 year campaign with the long term aim of normalising viral hepatitis and portraying it as a health condition without moralising.

The Love your Liver campaign provides a safe and non-threatening platform to start conversations with the general public about viral hepatitis. Everyone has a liver and therefore potentially has some interest in liver health.

To look after the liver, a healthy diet is a high priority. You should build regular light to moderate exercise into your routine. Alcohol intake should be also limited and if you smoke, talk to your pharmacist for assistance to stop.

Special subsidised antiviral therapy is available under certain criteria for people with confirmed hepatitis C infection. However these medicines are potent with possible interactions and side effects. Talk to your pharmacist about antiviral therapy.

Muscle and joint pain and pain in the area of the liver is frequently a symptom of hepatitis C and the appropriate use of pain relievers needs to be considered. Paracetamol and non-steroidal antiinflammatory pain relievers can be used (not exceeding the recommended doses and not in advanced liver disease). Heat packs and massage are also effective non-pharmacological options. Skin moisturisers, lubricating eye drops and saliva substitutes are also helpful to relieve the dryness caused by hepatitis C and you can find all of these products in pharmacies.

As we approach World Hepatitis Day on 28 July consider what changes you can make to improve the health of your liver. Your local pharmacy is your health destination and you can get more advice about hepatitis B and C from pharmacies delivering the Pharmaceutical Society of Australia's Self Care health information. Your Self Care pharmacy provides Fact Cards for *Alcohol, Staying a Non Smoker* and *Weight and Health*. Additionally, many pharmacies also offer services to assist people with quitting smoking and losing weight.

Gardens, Gardening and Gardeners Winter . . . a great time to work in the garden

Winter is upon us and while it may seem easier to curl up on the couch with a cup of tea and a good book, it is the perfect time to get amongst it in the patch so don the boots and get to it . . .

•Time to plant some winter crops – think about some leeks, rocket, beetroot, celery, lettuce (oak leaf), broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, onions, kale, kohl rabi, spinach and silverbeet.

•Pop in some coriander and chamomile... perfect for warming winter curries and cups of tea!

•Stick in some spuds - home grown is easy and incredibly rewarding. And don't forget about sweet potatoes, they are easy to grow and great to eat!

•There are a load of fruity favourites ready to go in including kiwifruits and figs! Remember that kiwi fruits need to cross pollinate so ensure you pick up one of each sex so that they can cross pollinate.

•Nuts, such as pecan, can also be planted. Beautiful trees in their own right, these nuts are number one in the garden!

•A seaweed tea or any low environmental impact liquid fertiliser is perfect for giving plants a kick start as they establish. Apply to the soil early in the morning and in the concentrations mentioned on the packet. Don't forget to give the fruit trees a bit of a feed as well.

•Much needed at this time of year is a bit of colour. Marigolds, lupins, pansies, violas, phlox, verbena and lavender (non-invasive varieties of course!). Popping these in around your veggies will give some colour and interest to the patch and act as beneficial insect attractors!

•Consider a green manure crop to add some life and love to an overworked patch. At this time of year try

millet, oats, lupins or field peas. This will improve your soil incredibly and, as a bit of forward planning, you'll find it well worth the effort!

•Water smarter at this time of year. Water first thing in the morning and instead of quickie irrigation, a nice, deep drink a couple of times is week far more а beneficial! Always check soil moisture before watering at this time of year....don't waste your precious drinking water if Mother Nature has already done all the hard work for you!



•Top up mulch on your veggie patches, herb

gardens and ornamental beds, especially important for weed suppression at this time of year. A hot tip is to mulch after watering, to a depth of about 7cm. Keep mulch clear of plant stems especially young seedlings. Choose sustainable, low environmental impact mulch, one that will enrich your soil as it breaks down. Also look for one that has done the least amount of travel to get to you.

•Weeding is still needed at this time of year. Most plant growth has slowed down though so it will not have to happen as often. But it also means that it is also a time of year to try and remove as many competitors as possible before the weather starts warming up again.



Clive has landed himself (paid) employment in a field he is


