Wild storm rips through Bowraville



On Saturday 23rd January a severe storm hit Bowraville around 1.30pm and then continued on to Valla.



Buildings in Bowraville as well as some houses lost part of their roofs as the furious storm swept through the Nambucca Valley. Trees were uprooted, buildings damaged and debris was strewn everywhere you looked.

All this destruction happened in just 15 minutes.

The Bowraville Fire Brigade was quick on the scene and had assistance from Macksville and Kempsey Fire Brigades. They did a great job covering roofs and removing fallen trees around town later that afternoon and into the evening.

On Monday the Nambucca Shire Council went around cleaning up branches and leaves that were still lying on the roads around Bowraville.

Thankfully there was no loss of life and no reports of injuries.





Too Close To Home

by Linwood Barclay Too Close to Home is about the murder of the Langley family who were neighbours and friends of the Cutter family. Derek Cutter and Adam Langley are teenage boys and good friends. When the Langley's leave for a holiday, Derek remains hiding in the house aiming to use it as a place to



meet his girlfriend but before she arrives, someone else does and kills the entire family. For obvious reasons Derek doesn't tell anyone that he was there. As the police investigate the events and why they occurred, skeletons start to come out of the closet and secrets are revealed. It all traces back to a novel that was on a dead student's computer, given to Derek and Adam by the boy's mother. Quite a few twists and turns – I enjoyed it.

Blue Smoke by Nora Roberts

This novel starts with young eleven year old Reena Hale witnessing the destructive fire that

burns down her parent's pizza restaurant. From that point on Reena knows she wants to be a fire investigator and goes about her education with that goal in mind. Along the way we get to know her mixed Anglo-Italian family (mostly Italian – stereotypically largely extended, close-knit, loud, affectionate etc). Her mentor from an early age is, Minton, the investigator of the pizza restaurant arson. As



Reena progresses through study to entry into the police

force and the fire investigation unit we meet O'Donnell, her police partner. Interspersed throughout the comings and goings of Reena's personal and work life are the thoughts of a psychotic, very angry, vengeful man who, unknown to Reena, has been keeping a careful eye on her year after year after year.

This is a 'whodunnit' based around the interesting and bewitching behaviour of fire, stir in some romance, add a murder or two and it's quite a bearable novel.

The Woods by Harlen Corben

I really enjoyed the twists and turns of this novel, thought I'd figured out where the plot was going and pleasantly discovered I couldn't predict it 100%. Paul Copeland is

the county prosecutor for Essex. Twenty years previously his sister had been one of 4 teenagers who walked into the woods, at a summer camp, and didn't come out. Two bodies were found at the time but the remaining two were never seen again. Cope, as he is now known, is a widow, raising his 6 year old daughter alone. When a homicide victim is found with evidence linking him to Cope, things in Cope's life begin to unravel and



buried secrets threaten the prosecutor's family. Cope has to decide what is better left hidden and what truths can be brought forward. He will have to decide whether to stand by his moral code or make decisions that challenge his ethics.

Grow your own frogs

It's been eight years since the Year of the Frog was declared and a new international conservation action plan launched.

Back then 500 zoos around the world enlisted to take part in



an amphibian "Noah's Ark" where most vulnerable species were moved to protected areas within aquariums and other institutions around the world to guarantee their future survival. Yet in 2015 the dramatic population decline of frogs continues with predictions that half of the world's species will be extinct in twenty years. It sounds an ominous note not just for all amphibians but the human species as well.

What a waste to lose these creatures that consume and help control insects and are themselves an important food source for birds, snakes and other organisms in the food web.

Frogs, researchers tell us, are 'bio-indicators' for the environment – they are especially sensitive to pollutants and pesticides and as a result they have fallen victim to pathogens including fungi, viruses and bacteria, wiping out entire populations.

What can gardeners do? By incorporating ponds it is gardeners who are in a position to restore and maintain a local population that once might have occupied uncultivated land. Since the 1980s frogs have disappeared fast from our suburbs - a direct consequence of habitat destruction, pollution, pesticide use and even artificial light (it attracts insects away from frog territory). We owe it to them to get back to basics and try to put water into our gardens.

A pond is not difficult to create - an extra large pot filled with water and a couple of water plants added with soon be the latest attraction in your garden for birds, bees and frogs.

Given the permeability of amphibian skin and their



general sensitivity it goes without saying that for a pond to be a frog haven it is essential that your garden stays free of chemicals – products like Roundup and Zero (the commonly used herbicide glyphosate), malathion or carbaryl all greatly increase tadpole

mortality. Slug pellets should be banned and won't be necessary anyway since frogs will eat up all available slugs.

And don't be impatient - frogs aren't meant to be shipped in, rather better to set up the right conditions perhaps even some shallow shelved areas where they can do their basking and they'll soon turn up.

Lawsuits against Chemical Agriculture Product Producers Begin

Reuters reports that law firms throughout the U.S are gathering numerous plaintiffs who are alleging exposure to Monsanto's weedkiller Roundup has caused them cancer.

Farm workers from several states who have cancers of some sort, some of a similar nature, have started lawsuits claiming glysophate a key ingredient in Roundup has caused them cancer. They further claim that Monsanto "falsified data" and "led a prolonged campaign of misinformation" to confuse the public.

Attorneys are citing strong evidence that links glyphosate to non-Hodgkin lymphoma and said they will likely collaborate as mass tort actions against Monsanto.

"We can prove that Monsanto knew about the dangers of glyphosate," said Michael McDivitt, whose Colorado-based law firm is putting together cases for 50 individuals. "There are a lot of studies showing glyphosate causes these cancers."

Roundup is used by farmers, homeowners and others around the globe and brought Monsanto \$4.8 billion in revenue in its fiscal 2015. But questions about Roundup's safety have dogged the company for years.

As people wake up to the fact that chemical agriculture is clearly not safe the good news is Monsanto is facing slumping earnings and has recently announced it will eliminate 12 percent of its workforce. Not good for workers but great for the health of people and the planet.

The good thing is Certified Organic products do not come with any worry about whether glysophate was used. It is a banned product in organic farming therefore your body and the farmer who produces the food is safe from these harmful chemicals. MACADAMIAS grown by Colin and Marie Kemp

Colin and Marie Kemp have been in the area for over 15 years now. Most readers would be familiar with Colin as the mastermind behind the Bowraville Community Technology Centre but he has another passion beyond sharing his knowledge of IT. When deciding where to move following a decision to leave the city life behind Marie and Colin had a small set of criteria: somewhere convenient to Sydney, with reasonable services and something that was affordable.

Bowraville fit the bill. The former dairy farms supplying cream to the local butter factory were just the type of set up that suited the Kemps' vision of their agribusiness venture. At first they started with olives but



soon learnt that they were not best suited to the area. It was not long before they caught sight of an opportunity over the hill in Valla where small holdings of macadamias had been initiated by some enterprising developers. Colin reflected on what size operation could generate a viable income and decided that around 3 thousand trees would generate a reasonable yield.

He and Marie went about the hard yards of setting up their operation, knowing full well that it was more than a matter of just putting a tree in the ground. The trees had to be nurtured and cared for with an adequate supply of water and fertiliser, soil had to be tested and a good cover of grass was needed to protect the roots and prevent soil erosion. Furthermore Colin and Marie had to support themselves whilst the trees grew up to a reasonable yield bearing age.

They have now just about made it to their farming independence but acknowledge that the effort has been part love part endurance. Colin says what he most likes about farming is the sense of personal responsibility. He explains his farming philosophy as one of 'biological farming'. He has respect and value for the native environment and has maintained and planted native trees on his block, amongst other things, to maintain the presence of barn owls. The owls are his environmental asset against rats who are attracted to the nuts and other plant litter from macadamia processing.

The hard part, that Colin had not anticipated, was the regular mechanical repairs and maintenance of machinery. That's his least liked aspect of farming macadamias. He values the local network of support he has to help him maintain and repair his equipment, the invaluable kind of knowledge that comes from having to fix things yourself. There is also local help from neighbourhood contractor Eddie, who spreads fertiliser as well as provides valuable area feedback. Colin also values the support of his network of local macadamia growers and the Australian Macadamia Society that provides advice on growing and marketing the crop. It seems there is little that Colin regrets about venturing into farming and he holds great optimism for the future of agriculture in the region.

You can find Colin on farm harvesting macadamias from April to September; it's a long harvesting season but a lifestyle worth investing in if you can get yourself away from the outstanding rural view enjoyed from his property. He says viability is not just about having a lot of trees, it requires dedication in getting the ground work right, making sure you can operate as efficiently as possible and drawing on the resources of local networks.

One thing that challenges the future of Colin and Marie's operation is hotter temperatures posed by climate change. Macadamias do not cope well in excessive heat so he is focused on maintaining good mulching practice to keep trees healthy enough to withstand the heat. - Colin and Maree were interview by BTC Volunteer, Andrea Grant.
